The **SAVE** Committee works to create opportunities for open campus dialogue on these sensitive topics, promote prosocial and proactive bystander intervention, and empower all members of the community to gain knowledge of support resources.

**Education** **SAVE** is committed to keeping informed of best practices, current research, and relevant news events. The committee will provide engaging presentations and forums addressing sexual assault, dating and domestic violence, and stalking.

**Cultivating Awareness** **SAVE** is committed to assessing and fostering awareness of campus climate and culture and connecting departmental offices to prevent fractured services.

**Promoting Prevention** **SAVE** is committed to providing campus education activities that encourage open and honest dialogue between community members, with a focus on encouraging prosocial and proactive bystander intervention.

**Empowerment** **SAVE** is committed to empowering survivors to make their own decisions about treatment as well as criminal, civil, and student conduct proceedings. **SAVE** will work to inform all community members about intervention and support resources available on the WPI campus and in the greater Worcester community.

# Supporting Students Who Disclose Sexual Violence

## Role as Faculty and Staff

As faculty and staff members, you have contact with many students and are in a position to identify and assist those who may need help. This brochure is designed to provide you with important information about resources available to all WPI students and how to support students who have been or may be impacted by sexual assault.

## What is Sexual Violence

Sexual assault is defined as any unwanted physical contact of a sexual nature that occurs without the consent of each participant or when a participant is unable to give consent freely. A person is legally incapable of giving consent if under 18 years of age; if intoxicated by drugs and/or alcohol; or if developmentally disabled.

Sexual violence includes a wide range of behaviors including non-consensual physical touching or kissing of a sexual nature, rape, sexual assault, attempts to commit rape or sexual assault, stalking, dating violence, and/or domestic violence.

National statistics suggest that between 20 and 25 percent of women and 6 percent of men will be sexually assaulted or experience attempted sexual assault during their college career. Approximately 50 percent of transgender people experience sexual violence at some point in their lifetime.

## Helping a Student

A student who has been sexually assaulted may talk to you 15 minutes or 15 years after an attack.

- If a student discloses the assault to you, a sensitive response will help her or him heal more quickly. It is important to believe the student and validate their experience. If a student tells you about an incident, it shows s/he trusts you. Open-ended questions such as “How can I help?” or “What do you need?” will prevent you from asking intrusive or judgmental questions (e.g., “Why did you trust him?” or “Couldn’t you scream?”) and convey a sense of support to the student.
- *It is important to note that WPI has a responsibility to make every effort to maintain a safe environment for all of its community members. If an administrator, faculty member, or staff member learns that a student has been sexually assaulted, they are expected to report the incident to the appropriate campus departments (Dean of Students Office, WPI Police, and/or the Title IX Coordinator) so that the campus can take action to support the student and the community.*
- Ensure that the student is currently safe. If not, contact Campus Police.
- Thank them for sharing this information with you, and acknowledge how challenging it might be to talk about this. Let them know that they are not alone and that what happened is not their fault.
- Know your limits. Let the student know how much support you can provide and that you don’t have all the answers. You can refer to the next panel to help the student identify different confidential and non-confidential options, yet let them make their own choices, and decide what to do next.
- Encourage the student to contact a Sexual Violence Advocate or the Counseling Center. Offer to contact an advocate together or to walk with them to the Counseling Center.
